

\$2.5M Health research centres launched

APHCRI has established three \$2.5 million Centres of Excellence to undertake research focused on key health reform challenges. The multi-institutional centres will be funded for four years to coordinate innovative, high quality and multidisciplinary research in primary health care policy and system improvement.
